PUNTA MITA, MEXICO (50 minutes north of Puerto Vallarta): Along the northernmost tip of Banderas Bay lies one of the most enchanted corners in the Mexican Riviera, Punta Mita. Covering over 1500 acres, the luxury destination is a spear-shaped peninsula surrounded on three sides by crystalline waters and nine miles of pristine coastline.

The name Punta Mita is derived from the Aztec word *mictlan* meaning *gateway to paradise*. "Over the years, Punta Mita has expanded to include St. Regis and Four Seasons hotels, 23 residential communities, multiple beach clubs, and two oceanfront Jack Nicklaus Signature courses," said Carl Emberson, director of operations at Punta Mita. "Preparation is now underway to break ground on two new luxury hotels and residences soon to be made public."



Located on the same latitude as the Hawaiian Islands and boasting more than 340 days of sunshine per year, you are virtually guaranteed sunny skies and balmy temperatures in Punta Mita. “You will appreciate the short flight times and plethora of non-stop itineraries,” smiled Emberson. “In about the time it takes to watch one movie, you arrive south of the border.”

This year, 13 teams participated in the 2nd annual Punta Mita Pro-Am. “The draw to sun-drenched paradise is undeniable,” explained Mark Pazdur, partner in the Punta Mita Pro-Am. “We had a bit of celebrity status on-hand this year. One of our professionals was Rhein Gibson, who shot a 55 [16 under par] at River Oaks Golf Club in Oklahoma, setting a Guinness World Record, and Franz Klammer, a gold medalist skier at the 1976 Olympics, competed on the appropriately named Team Olympians. Our host was Jean Van de Velde. We even had an amateur on the roster of players who is a free-style rapper!”

High heels and formal attire were left in the luggage for the Welcome Cocktail and Dinner Reception at MI TACO at the Punta Mita Surf Club. The private affair included hand-crafted drinks (with the best margaritas in Puerto Vallarta) and table-sharing entrees of fresh fish.

Did you know? In 1934, Fernand Petiot, a bartender at The St. Regis New York King Cole Bar, perfected the recipe for a vodka and tomato juice cocktail he dubbed the Bloody Mary. Deemed too vulgar a name for the hotel’s clientele, it was renamed the Red Snapper. Today, the Bloody Mary remains a signature cocktail of The St. Regis brand, with each hotel crafting its own interpretation. The St. Regis Punta Mita version—named Mita Mary—includes avocado, pepper, and tequila.

DAY ONE: PRACTICE ROUND + HORSERACE SHOOTOUT

Non-golfers enjoyed a private Whale Watching Excursion on Punta Mita’s resident speed boat. The trip did not disappoint since it is prime time season as the pods of whales are migrating north. Instagram-worthy moments were abound.

Golfers had a casual practice round followed by an afternoon, four-hole Horserace Shootout with 15 teams in attendance. Teams were eliminated until the field was whittled down to three, with the competition concluding on the iconic third hole, an island green par-3. After the dust settled, The A Team from Arizona proved victorious and 50,000 American Airlines miles richer for their endeavor.

DAY TWO: ROUND ONE + COOKING CLASS

The group of non-golfers enjoyed a Cooking Class at the Pacifico Beach Club.

Perfect weather conditions (with an ocean breeze off the Pacific) greeted teams on the Bahia Course. The format for the Pro-Am was two best balls—one gross, one net—with amateurs playing to 80 percent of their handicap. It was clear competitors showed up with their game face for the first round of the Pro-Am. At the conclusion of play, six professionals were within five shots of the lead (four of whom shot under par). For the team competition, it was too early to call a frontrunner.

First Place: Team Par, Then Bar – 138 – 131 = 269




Two best balls: One gross, one net with amateurs playing to 80% handicap and age appropriate tees.

For the golf professional: Up to a \$10,000 purse, with no buy-in required.
